UPDATE

MARCH PRIMARY: SLOW & STEADY PROGRESS FOR WOMEN

In our [last Alert](#), we shared a handful of toplines coming out of the March 2020 Primary. Here are some more takeaways as results have finalized:

➔ **More women ran for the CA Legislature in 2020 than in 2018.**

Women made up 38% of candidates running for seats in 2020, up from 31% in 2018. This forward motion was not guaranteed, given the relatively small number of open and swingable seats in 2020. An uptick in GOP women in 2020 made the partisan split among women candidates slightly less dramatic than in 2018, but the field remains overwhelmingly Democratic.

→ **Tough territory remains tough.**

In AD 17 through AD 33, no Democratic woman is advancing to the top two. This region, which includes Silicon Valley, but extends much further, has [historically been tough territory](#) for women candidates, despite the Bay Area's progressive reputation.

→ **More women are stepping forward to run in rural northern California, the Central Valley and the Inland Empire.**

Encouragingly, here is turf that has historically been light on-- if not hostile to-- women candidates, but where progress is on the horizon. Democratic women made the top two in northern Congressional, Senate and Assembly races. With the election in 2018 of Senator Melissa Hurtado of Sanger, more women up and down the I-5 corridor are taking an interest, and CTGCA is on the ground to identify and guide rising stars. And, two women in the Inland Empire will face off in two different Senate runoffs in 2020.

→ **Women (and men) candidates are flooding the field in open seats.**

With 12 year term limits, the open seat is gold. Expect larger and larger fields of candidates whenever a seat becomes vacant. The preparation CTGCA offers our Recruits can make or break.

→ **Credentials, experience, and picking your race dramatically increase the likelihood of a “job promotion.”**

Progressive women candidates with experience in public service fared much better than candidates who would have been new to elected office. Similarly, women who ran in *open* seats advanced to November much more often than those who challenged an incumbent of either party.

Our Conclusions?

→ **2020 is shaping up to be another “overperforming” year for women, but not in the way 2018 might have suggested.**

2018 wasn't an outlier, as women candidates continue to increase their numbers even with fewer open and competitive seats this cycle. While the

increase in numbers is incremental and includes more GOP women, any addition is a welcome sign that momentum for more women candidates continues, especially as they ascend from the Assembly to the Senate.

→ **To get beyond incremental change and into 50/50 territory, slow and steady will NOT win the race.**

2020 confirmed for us that the right women, with the right preparation, in the right seats, are tough to beat. Close the Gap's strategy starts with targeting open seats well ahead of elections and recruiting progressive women who have substantive relationships with their communities. That's what moves more women into office faster.

But hitting our goal of 50% women by 2028 hinges on preparing to [Mine the Motherlode](#) of open seats ahead. We can make big gains, but only if we have more Recruiters working with more prospective candidates beginning in 2020. That's where you come in.
