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## Where are the Women? How did we do?

It's been a week since the CA primary, and votes are still being counted in a few races involving women candidates. Here's what we do know:

## 1. Results

- o 76 women ran (47 D, 26 R)
- 42 will compete in 39 November races (24 D, 18 R) roughly the same result in 2012
- 40% of women advancing are women of color
- 9 non-incumbent progressive women advanced in open seats

## 2. Observations

- In multi-candidate open seat districts with 2 or more Democratic women, a Democratic women advanced to the top two in 6 out of 7 races.
- Money matters, but it doesn't always control the outcome.
- No woman legislator sought any of the 8 Constitutional offices.

## 3. Lessons

- The more women run, the more women win.
- "Viability" should be gauged by more than money.
  Field, social media, organizational support, quality of the candidate matter.
- Start early, engage organizational support, but don't count on it.
